#### Our culture

At Mypo, we take for granted many of the traditions, which are embedded in our culture. One is Sports' Day, where House Captains are responsible for choosing teams, organising practices (often in their lunch hour), and managing the day. This was the first year of same day entry, where we had students starting school at the age of 4. The captains really had their work cut out for them!

One of the best things about culture is that our students can use the hard work done by previous house captains as a springboard to accelerate their own effort and achievement. Nowhere is this more obvious than Sports' Day. The captains led by example, but understood the power of encouragement and support and walked (and ran) alongside many of the younger students. The captains moved many of the Receptions to be able to march in line, catch a ball, be a part of a team, and participate in team games.

#### A Fierce Friend

One of the best definitions of good parenting for tricky children I have ever come across derives from the Buddhist tradition. It's called 'fierce friendship'.

- . Treats their relationship as if there is no way out;
- . Acts as if they are always on their child's side; and


# Upper Primary Class River Reflections
