'When do you set boundaries for kids? Before kids do something new or when you see that they are needed? Let me explain...

Many parents set boundaries for their kids after the fact. That is, they'll get their kids a mobile phone, but won't set boundaries about when and how it should be used.

Suddenly, they see their young person on the phone all the time, even when they are at the meal table. They'll put some boundaries in place such as, "No texting, playing games (on the phone) or answering calls at the meal table." There's often resentment.

Such a boundary is met with resistance as you are pulling back a freedom. But they shouldn't have had this freedom in the first place.

Much easier to set some rules and boundaries in place earlier and grant more freedom as they get older. Same goes for going out (and home times); bedtimes (earlier rather than later); the use of toys and all forms of technology.

Sometimes it's hard to know what the rules should be until there has been an infraction. But a little forethought and common sense can help. Also a backbone helps too.

As I wrote in my book Thriving!, kids need boundaries. They often fight boundaries, but they teach them to be social; to be safe and to act in a way that respects the rights of others.'

At Mypolonga Primary School, our expectations are very high and very clear. All staff are on the same page in regards to behaviour and learning. As our students get older, they are rewarded with many more opportunities eg. decision making; our Upper Primary students are on various committees where they have a say and make a difference.

White Ribbon

Our school has chosen to become a White Ribbon School and this involves teaching our students through the Breaking the Silence Program. Breaking the Silence supports schools to bring about a



commitment to stop violence against women. It builds on existing initiatives to strengthen a culture of respect and equality at all levels of the school community – through curriculum, role modelling from staff, policies and procedures, domestic violence education programs and strengthened family and community partnerships.

Why are schools important to stop violence against women?

Young people form behaviours, social skills and relationships during their time at school. During these formative years, ideas about men, women and their relationships are being learned. Exposure to harmful messaging and gender stereotyping can lead to attitudes that support inequality and disrespect towards women.

Breaking the cycle of violence

Schools play a pivotal role in breaking the cycle of violence by teaching young people how to recognise and challenge violence against women and build respectful relationships. Breaking the Silence engages the wider school community to promote and role model gender equality and create a safe, inclusive school culture to stop violence against women.

We are very excited about this initiative and are keen to be involved. As a school, we will be participating in the Murray Bridge White Ribbon Day on Friday 23rd November 2018. We will be involved in a parade to show our commitment and then a free sausage sizzle for lunch. Our bus costs will be covered by the local council.
